Creditor Control and Conflict in Chapter 11 Dec 08 2021 We analyze a sample of large privately and publicly held businesses that filed Chapter 11 bankruptcy petitions during 2001. We find pervasive creditor control. In contrast to traditional views of Chapter 11, equityholders and managers exercise little or no leverage during the reorganization process: Seventy percent of CEOs are replaced in the two years before a bankruptcy filing; very few reorganization plans (at most eight percent) deviate from the absolute priority rule in order to distribute value to equityholders. Senior lenders exercise significant control through stringent covenants contained in DIP loans, such as line-item budgets. Unsecured creditors gain leverage through objections and other court motions. We also find that bargaining between secured and unsecured creditors can distort the reorganization process. A Chapter 11 case is significantly more likely to result in a sale if secured lenders are oversecured, consistent with a secured creditor-driven fire-sale bias. It is much less likely when these lenders are undersecured or when the firm has no secured debt at all. Our results suggest that the advent of creditor control has not eliminated the fundamental inefficiency of the bankruptcy process: resource allocation questions (whether to sell or reorganize a firm) are ultimately confounded with distributional questions (how much each creditor will receive), due to conflict among creditor classes.

The underlying explanation proposed in this dissertation is that while removing a leader from process decisions increases an autonomous group's task control, it also delegates to group members the need to manage interpersonal dynamics (such as communication and conflict) that accompany these decisions. Collective decisions made about how to manage group procedures communicate either that the group respects and values an individual member's contributions, or that it considers a member's contributions as relatively unimportant (Lind & Tyler, 1988). Without a legitimate authority to resolve differences about group procedures, rules, and resources, groups may be more prone to repeated or escalating process conflicts. Chapter 2 presents evidence from survey research that autonomous groups experience process conflict in two distinct dimensions: task strategy conflict and process disruption conflict. Scale validation results are presented of revisions to Jehn's three-pronged conflict classification in the groups literature. Results of Chapter 3 indicate that conflicts which are difficult to resolve often lead groups develop "process routines" (Argyris, 1977) that allow them to avoid conflict but not to resolve underlying structural issues that cause performance failures over time (Gladstein, 1984; Pondy, 1967). This does not reduce performance in the short-run, but does lead to a negative spiral of reactive process, inability to adapt group structure, and decrease in satisfaction and performance in the longer-term. Using social exchange theory, the final chapter presents the "exchange contract" model to describe how teams can reverse this cycle--or achieve proactive and adaptive self-management. A functional exchange contract is a clear and shared understanding among team members about equitable control of internal governance, complemented by equitable reciprocation of three explicit contract behaviors that make shared control easier: team integrity, communication about work, and flexibility. In place of a legitimate authority, these are the behaviors that make members feel group procedures are being applied to themselves and others fairly--predicting long term team performance and member satisfaction.

The Example of Danzig and the Giese Family Dec 16 2019 This article argues that a novel way to analyse maritime networks in premodern northern Europe is to trace the activities of people involved in conflict management. These people were traders, magistrates, judges, urban diplomats: sometimes all comprised in one person or a family. Specifically, if we take the Hanseatic city of Danzig and the Giese family as an example, it becomes apparent that these 'conflict managers' operated on various levels: the city, the region, the state, the Hanse and on the level of politics and economic policy between states and cities. Economic interests and conflicts were intertwined with political, social and cultural matters, and should be investigated together.

Human Rights and Conflict Resolution May 21 2020 Human rights and conflict resolution have been traditionally perceived as two separate fields, sometimes in competition or in tension and occasionally with contradictory approaches towards achieving a lasting peace. Social Psychology of Intergroup Reconciliation Feb 27 2021 The volume begins with an overview by Herbert Kelman discussing reconciliation as distinct from related processes of conflict settlement and conflict resolution. Following that, the first section of the volume focuses on intergroup reconciliation as consisting of moving beyond feelings of guilt and victimization (i.e., socio-emotional reconciliation). These processes include acceptance of responsibility for past wrongdoings and being forgiven in return. Such processes must occur on the background of restoring and maintaining feelings of esteem and respect for each of the parties. The chapters in the second section focus on processes through which parties learn to co-exist in a conflict free environment and trust each other (i.e., instrumental reconciliation). Such learning results from prolonged contact between adversarial groups under optimal conditions. The contributions in the third part apply the social-psychological insights discussed previously to an analysis of real world programs to bring reconciliation (e.g., Tutsis and Hutus in Rwanda, Israelis and Palestinians, and African societies plagued by the HIV epidemic and the Western aid donors). In a concluding chapter Morton Deutsch shares his insights on intergroup reconciliation that have accumulated in close to six decades of work on conflict and its resolution.
